



Get a Social Security Number

If you have been told by USCIS or an attorney that you are eligible, you may be able to get a Social Security Number.

You must visit a social security office in person to complete and sign an application for a Social Security Number. To find the office location nearest you, visit <https://secure.ssa.gov/ICON/main.jsp>

The Social Security office requires:

1. Proof of Immigration Status (choose one):

- A work permit
- A legal permanent residence card (green card)
- Form I-94, proof of Asylum status

2. Work Eligibility (choose one):

- A work permit
- Form I-94, proof of Asylum status

3. Proof of Age (choose one):

- A birth certificate
- If you are unable to obtain your birth certificate, the SS Department may consider your passport or immigration ID document instead.

4. Proof of Identity (choose one):

- A legal permanent residence card (green card)
- A passport
- A work permit

Note: you must bring original copies of all documents! Copied or notarized documents will not be accepted by the Social Security office.



The DMV: Be Prepared!

Before you to to the DMV for a driver's license, make sure that you have all of the following:

1. Proof of U.S. Citizenship or lawful presence in the country (choose one):

- A work permit
- A government-issued birth certificate
- A U.S. passport
- A foreign passport with U.S. immigration documents

2. A Social Security Card

- DACA recipients can get a Social Security Card from the Social Security Administration
- OR, if you have been told by USCIS or an attorney that you are eligible, you may be able to get a Social Security Card.

3. Proof of full legal name (choose one):

- A birth certificate
- A marriage certificate
- A passport
- A work Permit

4. Proof of your address (choose one):

- A bill
- A bank statement
